Statement on Separated Parents

At Christ the King CVA we recognise that while some parents may be divorced or separated, both have a right to be informed of, and involved in, their child's educational progress.

Evidence shows that after separation children do best when those around them cooperate, provide stability, and avoid conflict. We understand that this can be difficult and parents can become estranged.

Our aim is to work with all parties to promote positive family involvement. This statement clarifies what is expected from separated parents and carers, the school and its staff.

- It is the responsibility of parents to inform the school when there is a change in the family's circumstances. We need to be kept up to date with contact details, arrangements for collecting children and emergencies.
- The information provided to school detailing whether both parents have parental responsibility, will be presumed to be correct unless a court order or original birth certificate proving otherwise is provided to the school.
- All diary dates, Newsletters, and Principal's letters are available on our website at www.christtheking.notts.sch.uk. Emails will be sent to both parents. Parents are responsible for providing a correct email address. Occasionally paper letters are sent home with students and we expect parents to communicate these messages to each other as and when appropriate.
- We will hold one parent's evening appointment per child where both parents are welcome and we expect parents to communicate with each other regarding these arrangements. If parents are unable to do this then we expect parents to take it in turn. Unfortunately the school is unable to offer individual appointments.
- We expect parents to liaise and communicate directly with each other in matters such as the ordering of school photographs; tickets for performances and other instances.
- Both parents are entitled to receive progress reports and review their child's student records. Progress reports will be sent to the parent with whom the child resides with the expectation that he/she will share the report with the other parent. The school will email copies of progress reports to the non-custodial parent if a written request is submitted.
- Both parents are legally entitled to collect their child from school unless a court order is provided that states otherwise. In all cases, the school will be mindful of its safeguarding responsibilities and may use its discretion not to send a child home with a particular parent

We are currently reviewing our policies in order to comply with the Governments guidance on Parental Responsibility and the duty that "Schools and local authority staff must treat all parents equally, unless there is a Court order limiting an individual's exercise of parental responsibility." and the requirements placed on schools by The Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006.

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
