

I hope that you have all had a restful half term break. I wanted to say thank you to all who took the time to complete the parental survey last half term. We had 275 responses. We always appreciate you taking the time to provide us with your views as your feedback allows us to identify the areas that you, as parents, feel that we are successful in as well as the areas for further improvement.

We are pleased to know that your children **feel safe** in school, that you feel that **behaviour is good** and that students are shown how to **behave respectfully** towards others. It is also good to hear that you value the **Catholic Life and Mission of the school**. We were also pleased to see that there have been improvements since the last survey on your responses to the questions about knowing **what your children will learn** and how **well they are doing**.

The areas that you have told us that you would like us to improve are related to **communication** and your **involvement in the prayer life** of the school. We have just launched the Arbor app which, when you all have access to this, will make communication smoother. We have also recently appointed a second Lay Chaplain to work across our hub who has lots of ideas about how we can involve you in the prayer life of the school so we will be sharing these with you soon.

There are a small number of parents who expressed concerns of an individual nature. As the survey is anonymous, I am not able to contact you directly. If you have concerns, please can I urge you to contact the relevant staff member to discuss this. ### Catholic Life and Mission

Our focus this term is obviously on our Lenten pledges. We will spend time in prayer on Ash Wednesday asking our students to focus their thoughts on how we can take part in the three challenges of Lent to pray, fast and give to others. **Pray** 

Students will be given the opportunity during form Acts of Worship to reflect on the stations of the cross. These are prayerful reflections on Jesus' journey to the cross. ### Fast

Students are being encouraged to give something up during Lent to share in Jesus' experience in the desert at the start of his ministry. We are encouraging them to think about how fasting doesn't have to mean going without, it can also be a commitment to do more for those around them.

### Give to others

There will be several fundraising events taking place this half term, including a non-uniform day, cake sales and much more. We encourage students to do what they can to support these events.

### <u>Safeguarding</u>

Last term we celebrated Children's Mental Health Week in school. The theme this year was **'Let's connect'**. Students were asked to reflect on the importance of the people in their lives who they have connections with. Miss Tyrrell, along with members of the School Council, led the school in an Act of Worship that reminded us that God created us to be in connection with others. He asks us to show love for others in these connections through the commandment to "Love our neighbour".

Events were organised throughout the week to show students how to build healthy connections with others, particularly reminding them of the importance of keeping themselves safe in these connections.

School council members offered sessions during the week to encourage us to speak to others and make connections, building new relationships with others within the community. Students were offered crafting and mindful activities as well as opportunities to use prayer and meditation to support their mental health. They also organised a bake sale to raise money for Place2Be, a children's mental health charity.







# **Behaviour and Attendance**

## Uniform

Following the half term break, we still have several students who are not arriving at school in their full school uniform. If your child has grown out of their school shoes, then a replacement will be necessary. Blazers and ties are a compulsory item and MUST be worn at all times.

## **Conduct Curriculum**

We began this half term with our conduct curriculum lesson that celebrated the achievements of many students in school. We also issued reminders to students about our Classroom CARE Habits and Respectful communication. We paid particularly attention to how students conduct themselves within our community on their way to and from school. We appreciate your support with ensuring that your children make a positive contribution to our community, always conducting themselves in a safe and respectful manner, on buses and whilst walking to and from school.

### Attendance

Improved attendance continues to be a focus in school, and we encourage our students to attend school and aim for a minimum of 97% of the time. This is proven to have a positive impact on student outcomes. The school day begins at 8:45am and we expect students to be on the school site in good time to arrive at form at 8:45am.

## Year 11 and Year 13 mock examinations

### Sixth Form

Since the end of last half term, every student in Year 11 has had a Post-16 meeting with a member of the Senior Leadership Team or Head of Sixth Form. These meetings are set up to support our students in making the right decision for them with regards to their next steps in education, training or employment.

Naturally, during these conversations, a large number of students outline their desire to remain with us in the sixth form as they appreciate the supportive community here at Christ the King. A large number of students also reference the expert teaching that they receive during their time with us and feel that as our teaching staff know their strengths and best ways to learn, it makes sense to extend their journey with us as they move into Post-16 education.

Students who have not yet applied to the sixth form but do intend to stay need to make sure that their applications are handed in by 6th March to ensure that their subject choices are considered when creating the option blocks for Post 16. If you have a child in Year 11, please discuss this with them to ensure that they have handed in their application.

# <u>Chaplaincy</u>

# **CTK School Council**

To support the work of the Eco Team in school, this term the School Council will be organising a (RE)LoveOurStuff event, which will take place during the last week of term. This will allow us to develop our mission as Stewards of Creation, help cut our carbon footprint as well as make us think about the impact of fast fashion and textile waste.

Initially, the School Council will be organising a pop-up secondhand store, offering preloved uniform. To do this they will need your help and support. Could you please send in any preloved uniform donations, including PE kit, into school, either with students directly or drop it into the recycling tub in reception. Hopefully this will go a little way to help us reduce the 1.4 million school uniform that are thrown away every year as well as help us with the increasing cost of living that we are all experiencing.

If this proves to be successful, their aim is then to run this each term and extend it to include nonuniform items too.

After the school council will be looking to launch our Get Loud on Litter Campaign, the aim of which is to review the litter situation in school as well as make us all think about the amount of litter that we all produce and how we can dispose of this more effectively.

### Careers

This half term we have a busy schedule in our careers curriculum including individual careers lessons in Years 9 and 11 and a bespoke lesson for our Year 9 SEND students, as well as our usual 1-1 careers advice for Year 11 students.

We also have careers week from 27th Feb - 3rd March. During the week, students can sign up to lunch time sessions with a wide variety of employers and universities. There will be 10 sessions running throughout the week.

# <u>Reading</u>

The last two weeks of half-term saw students in Year 7 and 8 complete STAR reader tests. Several students made impressive gains in their reading ages to demonstrate their passion for reading, and all students should now have their latest ZPD (Zone of Proximal Development) number written on the front of their purple reading diaries to help them choose their next book appropriately. Students and parents can use <u>www.arbookfind.co.uk</u> to check that book levels are in line with student ZPDs.

So far this year, students in Year 7 and 8 have managed to successfully pass 778 reading comprehension quizzes on Accelerated Reader which sees them accumulate in excess of 32,000,000 words and, if we include Year 8's statistics from last year, the total raises to an even more impressive 74,000,000 words over almost 2,000 quizzes. Currently leading Year 7 are 7W, with over 8,700,000 words, and 8A, who are on a mind-blowing 23,000,000.

Of course, there are students who are making extra special efforts to increase their reading ages (or maybe they just love books?!) and our most recent Reading Millionaires are Kitty Dickinson, Torres Wong, Fiona George, and William Sinclair who have all been issued with special badges to acknowledge their efforts. Naturally, an extra special mention must go to Maia Ritoridis who is our latest Reading Multimillionaire and she has been issued with a golden reading badge to celebrate her being only the 6<sup>th</sup> student in the current Key Stage 3 who has reached this spectacular landmark!

Finally, a huge thankyou to all parents who are supporting their child's learning by encouraging reading – whether it's through reading with them or to them, speaking to them about what they are currently reading, or helping them to set and achieve targets related to their reading – it really does make a massive difference to their academic progress and life chances.
