

Congratulations to all students who entered some amazingly inspired work!



Everybody at Christ the King wishes to congratulate Sofia Costello on her astounding achievement for qualifying in the World Cup Dance finals with a solo piece.


A very happy Sofia said,

Sixth Former Heading to Oxford

Mr Reddington - Head of Sixth Form asks all the questions



So Alicja, you've been offered a place to study Medicine and the University of Oxford next year, you must be over the moon.

I am absolutely overjoyed. When I found out about it I couldn't believe it was true-even now getting emails from Oxford Undergraduate Admissions seems unreal. It's been a lifelong dream for me so it's taking some time to set in.

Have you always known that you wanted to study medicine? What has inspired you?

Medicine has always been a natural choice for me. I spent a lot of my childhood in hospitals but the doctors always made the environment feel like home to me. I was always mesmerised by their knowledge and ability to change people's experience and save their lives. They were my childhood heroes and I have tried to emulate them ever since.

You're hopefully going to one of the top Universities in the world, Oxford. What has the process been like in applying there?

The process of application seemed really daunting at the beginning. It seemed like so many factors to take care of and make sure that they were of the best quality. Doing the UNIQ Oxford Summer School really helped me- they broke down the process into small manageable chunks and explained which parts to prioritise. When it came to actually doing it, it wasn't as stressful and I'd say I even found it interesting. The extra things I've had to do was another admission test in November called the BMAT and I think just fine tuning my personal statement to show how much passion I have for the field.

Have there been extra things that you've had to do to get an offer?

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What did you have to include in your application? What was the interview like?

The application process was the same as for other universities. The only additional part in picking Oxford was choosing which college I would like to attend at Oxford. I picked The Queen's College. It was the interviews that was the biggest difference and something I had to put a lot of my efforts into. Oxford interviews are unlike any other, but the way I thought about them to calm my nerves was that they were "conversations about medicine". Looking back on them that's all they really were-questions were asked of me but I was not expected to know any medical knowledge beyond A-Level content. The most important part was to be receptive to their comments and show that I have potential to be taught. Interviews are meant to mimic tutorials which are one of the things that really drove me to apply to Oxford. They are sessions with a tutor and only 2 or 3 students. They are testing your thought process but if you are truly enthusiastic about your subject it's a great experience as you get to speak to academics who have worked in the field for a long time.

How have CTK supported you with the application process?

As I took 3 sciences, I was spending most of my time at the Science department. All of my teachers showed me great support, reassuring me that I could come to them with any problems and always encouraging me to strive for the best. All the sessions that we did for CPSD that were getting us ready for university, and that explained the UCAS process, were very helpful.

Did you find the distance learning a challenge?

Distance learning has definitely been challenging. The self-motivation component was definitely something I struggled with at first. It was so important to plan your time out correctly and keep a good work-rest balance. As difficult as it was I think overall it was a great preparation for the life of a university student as it taught me how to be independent.

What A Levels have you studied at CTK Sixth Form and how will they help you with medicine?

I study chemistry, biology, physics and maths. Biology forms the foundation of the first years of medical school as we are taught the basics of how the body works and how things go wrong. Chemistry is important in understanding biological processes and reactions that take place in the body as well as how drugs work. Maths will definitely help me with my problem solving abilities which are so important, both in exams at university as well as when I'm working as a doctor, whilst physics has helped me to apply concepts I've learnt about to the real world.

Finally, what have been your best memories of your time here at CTK Sixth Form?

There are many great memories from CTK Sixth Form so it'd be difficult for me to point out single experiences. However the answer I would like to give is that I will definitely fondly remember my time here. The best memories are in the mundane-day to day free periods and lessons. People - students, staff - is what makes this sixth form what it is. The sense of community is so strong in the sixth form that every day I feel comfortable and happy to be here. I will definitely miss CTK.

Famous Oxfordians

Twenty-eight British Prime Ministers have been educated at Oxford University. Of which, 13 were educated at Christ Church, 3 at Trinity, 4 at Balliol, 2 at Brasenose and one each at Hart Hall (now Hertford), Jesus College, St Hugh's, St John's, Somerville, and University College.



Throughout its history, gifted men and women have studied or taught at the University. This includes no less than 28 British Prime Ministers, 30 international leaders, 55 Nobel Prize winners, plus 120 Olympic medal winners. Poets, Writers, Judges, Comedians, Broadcasters, Chefs, Athletes, Actors, Lawyers, Economists, Scientists and so many other talented people have passed through Oxford's doors; many of whom are recognisable from the images above.




Chaplaincy

A very kind member of the Good Shepherd Parish managed to get hold of some statues of Our Lady of Fatima and she kindly donated one to each of the schools within our hub, Saint Oscar Romero Hub. Caroline Smith boxed one along with some rosary beads for each school. With Caroline's generous gift we have created a prayer focus area, dedicated to Our Lady of Fatima.

Our Lady of Fátima or Our Lady of the Rosary, is a title given to the Blessed Virgin Mary as She appeared in apparitions reported by three shepherd children at Fátima in Portugal. These Apparitions occurred on the 13th day of six consecutive months in 1917, the first on 13 May and the last today, 13 October 2017. Her message was one of hope, repentance and conversion for the whole world.
