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#### **Book of Hope**

Since the start of the Jubilee Year, we have had a Book of Hope travelling around school. Each form has taken some time to reflect on what brings them hope and how they can share this with others. These ideas have been recorded in our Book of Hope with students contributing some beautiful artwork, prayers and reflections. It will continue to travel around the forms next term and will be a lasting legacy of this Jubilee Year.

#### Jubilee Icon

On 8th July, the CAFOD Jubilee Icon, painted by Ethiopian artist, Mulugeta Araya, visited our school as part of a pilgrimage which saw it visit all 36 schools in the Our Lady of Lourdes Trust over four days. This icon, which interprets Jesus' teaching of healing and liberation in Luke 4:16-21 is particularly relevant to the Jubilee given its focus on bringing good news to the poor and freedom to those who are captive or oppressed.

A group of our students welcomed the icon to CTK and we prayed a decade of the rosary together before it left to travel around the remaining schools.





<u>Jubilee Mission Day – Harrison year 8</u>

Until the During our Jubilee Mission Day on 10th July, all of our lessons were delivered with a focus on our school mission along with the theme of this Jubilee Year. We had to think about how each of our subjects help us to contribute to society and why this is important. We were all given a 'Pilgrim of Hope' passport where we had to write a mission that was linked to each subject. Jubilee stickers were given out to those who had the best ideas.

# Opportunities in the chapel

Here at CTK, we are lucky to have lots of chances to grow closer to God. We take part in things like Mass, Adoration and Reconciliation, which help us to slow down, think, and spend time with God during our busy school days.

#### Adoration:

Adoration is quiet, calm and very peaceful. It is a time during the day when we can sit with God and talk to Him in our hearts. It helps us to feel calm and closer to Him. We don't have to say anything out loud – we just sit, pray and think.

#### **Reconciliation:**

Reconciliation is when we get to say sorry to God through the priest and to ask for forgiveness. It's a very special experience that helps us to feel free and peaceful afterward. It's a chance to let go of anything we feel bad about and make a fresh start with God.

#### <u>Mass:</u>

We have Voluntary Mass on the first Friday of the month in the chapel. It is really calm and peaceful. Each house also has a Mass to celebrate the feast day of one of their House Saints with all forms contributing to make these a really special event. Mass helps us to feel more connected to God and is a special time to pray and reflect.

#### <u>Year 10 Briars trip -</u> Caspar and Alistar year 10


